Introduction

ASSITEJ South Africa is calling for your participation in inter-cultural exchanges.

ASSITEJ SA is calling for your participation in inter-cultural exchanges that might lead towards performance, showcasing and discussion at the 2017 World Congress. This is part of our three year programme of looking at how to take the work of ASSITEJ "one step beyond" where we've been in the last 50 years, in relation to three key themes: inter-generational exchange, inter-disciplinary exchange and finally, inter-cultural exchange.

Of course inter-cultural exchange speaks to a fundamental driver of ASSITEJ, which was created "to unite theatres, organisations and individuals across the world dedicated to theatre for children and young people". Why do we feel this drive to connect across space, languages and cultures? For anyone who has experience of inter-cultural collaboration and exchange, they will know that it is not always that comfortable or that easy! It can be highly challenging for all sorts of reasons. However it is often these very challenges that are triggers for us to view ourselves differently, push ourselves out of our habits, enrich our processes and create work which stretches the boundaries of expression.

This drive to exchange across cultural boundaries can be highly creative. After all, true creativity is often found in the collision and reintegration of disparate elements into new wholes – so generosity and openness to sharing, as well as openness to receive what is unfamiliar, strange or uncomfortable are an investment in a more creative future...for ourselves and our audiences.

Current news describes Europe as facing a "colossal humanitarian catastrophe", as refugees stream across the Mediterranean and through porous Middle-Eastern borders. This situation is found the world over, and is creating an environment where inter-cultural exchange is not only desirable, but also profoundly necessary. How do we cope with the changing face of the world and of cultures which cannot be static, but which are challenged to evolve and adapt under these kinds of pressures? How do we speak to children and young people who are displaced and experiencing a cultural onslaught of unimaginable proportions? How do we as artists recognise the need to collaborate with those whose understanding of what art is, whose training and experience, whose whole perception of the world, is fundamentally different to ours? And what does this encounter give us that will help us to be better artists and better, more empathetic human beings?

A key factor in the inter-cultural exchanges for the 2017 World Congress is that one of the partners should be from Africa. We hope that by pushing this exchange with Africa, we will be able to integrate more African artists into the work of the organisation as a whole, and also find ways that artists from countries outside of Africa can learn from the rich heritage, energy and talent that African artists can bring to the table. We also hope that this will give artists an opportunity to reach out to those within the refugee diaspora and to start to create new artistic communities wherever they happen to be.

We recognise that many artists within the broad fabric of ASSITEJ have not had exposure to seeing African performance for young audiences, or to working with African theatre makers. Hopefully 2017 will be the year in which African work for young audiences will be properly showcased for the first time within the ASSITEJ community, and hopefully this will lead to

more inter-cultural collaborations and exchanges into the future... thus allowing us all to take "one step beyond" where we have been before.

DREAMS OF THE HUMAN FAMILY

The things that shape us, our character, are the ones that are locked in our memory – endeavors and events we have experienced and which have become memories. The things we remember sometimes originate in our fellows' desire to remember. Even events at whose center we ourselves stood reach our memory through the memory of others. We gathered them to ourselves from the memory of others, from stories they related to us.

Those with a rich imagination are even likely to remember things they have not experienced at all, but which through the power of that same imaginative memory became a real and well-remembered personal experience. In the theatre we find all of those memories of ours anew, the real ones and the ones that are figments of personal and collective memory.

That is the power of the theatre – the power to raise consciousness, associations, emotions, blocks of memory. The theatre is one of the most important art forms in the cultural life of human society, for it is engaged in all the spheres of human life. In children's theatre, the young audience encounters not only a familiar reality, but also a new and still unfamiliar one. They absorb refreshing impressions and discover new possibilities – the formation of a new life experience.

The theatre deepens and enriches the child's sensitivity by means of the renewed encounter with a familiar, close world that is known to him.

The theatre broadens the child's horizons by helping him to soar on the wings of imagination to unknown, distant, strange and enchanted worlds. A visit to the theatre creates in the young audience an emotional and intellectual collective memory – vestiges of linguistic, visual and ideological associations.

In the theatre, the child relives not only his memories and personal dreams, but also memories and dreams of the human family, of his ancestors, of his nation, of the entire human race! Children's theatre in our multicultural world has a special role to play in laying common cultural foundations that will bring the other closer: through its universal values it can convey a message of the beauty in human beings, and through acting express the secret of joy, childhood, longing and hope.

ASSITEJ Canada Good, and Less Good News From Quebec



Government Investments

The Government of Quebec recently announced it will invest in two projects that will largely contribute to the development of theatre for younger audiences in Canada. The government guaranteed financial support for the construction of a multifunctional venue in Montreal, that will be shared by Maison Théâtre and the college cégep du Vieux Montreal. With 26 professional youth theatre companies in their membership, Maison Théâtre is essential to the engagement of young audiences across Canada. The new venue will present pieces that ask for more intimacy like those that are addressed at very young audiences, as well as experimental productions. The funds will also be invested in the renovation of the magnificent theatre hall that Maison Théâtre occupies since over 30 years.

The Government of Quebec also announced to financially support the theatre company Le Carousel in its efforts to create, in collaboration with Théâtre Le Clou, an international research and creation center for youth theatre under the name Cube. This centre will be a place of experimentation, exchange and advanced training. Through residences, Cube will host artists and companies creating theatre for young audiences. Cube wants to support the evolution and the development of creative youth theatre practices on a local, national and international level. Both companies responsible for the creation of this promising project, Le Carousel and Théâtre Le Clou, are nationally and internationally renowned for the excellence and relevancy of their practice.



Converging Views

Throughout the last few years and almost simultaneously, the spokespersons of theatre for young audiences for Wallonie-Bruxelles, France and Quebec worked on their policies concerning the development and the support of

the theatre for children and young people. They each have analyzed their respective regions and produced documents containing proposals and recommendations. In December 2013, the Centre Wallonie-Bruxelles in Paris gathered organizations of three French-speaking countries for a meeting under the title *Regards croisés sur les états des lieux et revendications en Europe et en Amérique francophone*, a conference on the contemporary situation of youth theatre in Europe and in French-speaking America. Organized in association with TUEJ (Montreal), SCÈNES D'ENFANCE ET D'AILLEURS (France), CTEJ

ASSITEJ Korea

Korean theatre companies tour internationally this summer



Four Korean theatre companies, members of ASSITEJ Korea had several opportunities to meet with international audiences this summer. Each company was invited to prestigious festivals and theatres in the UK, India and Argentina.

"Brush" by Haddangse, the 22nd Seoul Children Theatre Awards piece for Best Director and Best Actor was presented in the Korean Season program at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. Since the company won Asian Arts Awards at this festival last year, it has got a chance to tour in the UK this year, including the Kingston Welcomes Korea Festival.

Manetsangsahwa performed "Puppet Fantasy, Hooray!" at the Little Festival and the Aha! Festival in India with the support and arrangement of InKo Centre, a cultural institution funded by TVS Motor Company, India and Hyundai Motor India Limited.

Theater Ro.Gi.Narae played "The Woodcutter and Heavenly Maiden" at the International Theatre Festival of Integration and Recognition in Formosa, Argentina and received fervent responses. "Paper Window" by Ccotbbat was invited to the same festival with Theater Ro.Gi.Narae and two other venues, El Centro Cultural Presidente Néstor Kirchner and Teatro Real. It was standing room only and five Argentine media covered this tour.

> Collaboration work between Korean and Danish theatre companies

Play BST from Korea and Teatergruppen Batida from Denmark will start a long-term



exchange program this autumn.

Play BST will visit Copenhagen in September to perform "A Bird Story (Bongjangchui)" at various venues in Denmark such as Teatre North West. "A Bird Story" is a collaborative creation by actors of Play BST, which reinterprets the traditional Korean music, Bongjangchui with puppets and instruments.

This project aims not only to exchange their repertoires but also to strengthen a network between Korean and Danish TYA.

The 12th ASSITEJ Korea Winter Festival will be held from January 7 to 16, 2016

The latest outstanding Korean pieces, mostly nominated for the 24th Seoul Children's Theatre Awards will be on stage and international festival organizers, presenters and other professionals are to be welcomed. ASSITEJ Mexico

Ibero-American SM Prize for Children and Youth's Literature

Antonio Malpica Maury, author of children's literature, became the first Mexican author to obtain the Ibero-American SM Prize for Children and Youth's Literature, which is given by the SM Foundation along with different continental organizations of literature promotion and the International Book Fair (FIL) of Guadalajara; thus, in the 11 years of the award's history, which is given to creators in Spanish and Portuguese, it is finally in the hands of a prominent storyteller from our country.

The jury awarded the prize to Malpica for the "broad spectrum of themes, genres, moods and styles handled in his extensive work, as well as the variety of recipients to whom it is addressed," and for his "sensitivity to address social, complex issues, shedding light on the dark areas of our world."



The Ibero-American SM Prize was founded in 2005 to recognize those writers who have developed a literary career that focuses on young readers. It is convened annually by the SM Foundation and receives support from the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) office in Mexico, the International Board on Books for Young People (IBBY), the Organization of Ibero-American States (OEI), and the Regional Center for Book Development in Latin America and the Caribbean (CERLALC), in collaboration with the FIL of Guadalajara.

The 11th edition of the International Titerías Festival

The 11th edition of the International Titerías Festival will be held from September 5-18, 2016 in Mexico City. There will be 3 main venues and La



Titería, house of the puppet company Marionetas de la Esquina, will not only hold performances, but will also re-launch the Puppet Laboratory, a project that seeks to push young people towards creating shows parting from the exploration of puppet, object and theatre for children. It is a time of crisis, to reinvent oneself, to create, always maintaining quality. Under this premise, our program focuses on three issues of children's and puppet theatre: one-man shows, theatre for babies and magic boxes, formats that the development of small shows that will premier at La Titería in the summer of 2016.

From July 27 – August 10, La Titería had Natacha Belova as a resident artist. Her character development workshop triggered investigation, exploration of material and actorobject relationships parting from half body parts and puppets.

The 15 professionals who took part in the workshop, ended with endearing characters and the possibility of taking them onstage soon. La Titería offers artistic residencies to those interested in working with Mexican artists in artistic and theatrical investigation in puppet theatre for children.

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50th Anniversary Section

On this occasion, we are sharing contributions on the history of ASSITEJ Poland and ASSITEJ Zimbawe.

My favourite project ASSITEJ Poland

There's a long tradition of ASSITEJ theatre camps in Poland. An astonishing number of small projects are realised at each camp (at least two each day) and they provide an opportunity for young people aged 16 -22, who during the school year attend drama clubs, theatre schools or are award winners of drama competitions, to come together.

As a member of the jury, a director and children's



playwright it was with great pleasure that I participated in these camps, for even though I had to dedicate two weeks of my holiday they also delivered so much positive energy and material for consideration, that looking back now I can't be sure whether I taught others more or whether I actually learnt more. (Particularly during the camps to which I took my own children when they were growing up.)

An especially valuable aspect of the camps was that apart from being given a lot of theoretical advice, teenage playwrights were able to see how their texts sounded in public.

And so it was, until one year Poland became part of the European Union.

Assitej IATA Zimbabwe

Following my appointment as new National Administrator cum Director for Assitej/ IATA Zimbabwe, I had a vision to work towards the improvement of many issues. The biggest among them was the



growth of membership and a more reliable structure which was decentralised. My dream to make Assitej Zimbabwe grow as one of the biggest Centres within the continent has come to be exciting. Previously the national Association used to recruit school and community based organisations as members. They joined through their own interest and choice and this resulted in our membership being too scattered for smooth operations. This experience was not very user friendly and sometimes one could drive for more than 250KM to visit one or two members' schools.

A concept of a national festival was accepted by the honourable Minister of Primary and Secondary Education in Zimbabwe and he went on to support our initiative to organize all the schools in their respective structures. By so doing, authority was hereby granted for Assitej Zimbabwe to establish branches and chapters within Zimbabwe's ten provinces and more than sixty six districts. The idea of a national festival is a most welcome development that the Ministry supports fully. The Ministry also felt the the national festival will undoubtedly help learners to develop their skills in the areas of theatre and hopefully will help them to take up as careers in this genre in the future.
