Sharing? What sharing?

"H'm--!" said Pinocchio, nodding his wooden head, as if to say, "It's the kind of life which would agree with me perfectly."

From "Mein Kampf" to the recent slaughters in Paris, through the continuous flow of horrors that seems to rage on earth, all the contemporary history reveals the load of hate and violence borne by the denial of this simple reality: as the world is saturated with exchanges and communication, there is no society which is not multicultural.

For an educator, for a parent, to transmit the tools which will allow the children to think and to experiment with multiculturalism is, therefore, of the highest importance. As it can, but on the bases of the foundations designed by the International Convention on Children's Rights and the Convention on Diversity of Cultural Expressions, ASSITEJ is one of the organisations that, empirically, step by step, encounter by encounter, produces these tools. Not as a concept, but as a thought in motion, a Praxis of living together.

It has, for these purposes, the benefit of an amazing material: Theatre. Arts, performing arts in the first place, are multicultural by nature. Actors tour. From city to city, from country to country, they pass on ideas, aesthetics, shared emotions.

Yet, is sharing enough? Can the young human, over-informed witness of the fierceness of social relations, of the bewildering inequity of individual destinies, be satisfied with a "being together" without questions, timeless, in which any existential issue can be dissolved, either by buying new goods, or by the blind following of a dogma? What does "sharing" mean, without critical thinking?

Theatre, art of the sprayed speech, one of the first mass medias, is there, in the front line. It is upon us, adults, artists, advocates of culture, to promote an exigent, creative theatre. A theatre that hustles, more than it seduces, and that pushes the walls of alienation.

Natalia Sats

Manon van de Water, member of the ASSITEJ Executive Committee was in Moscow, Russia from October 11-19 to give a lecture on The Life and Work of Natalia Ilinichna Sats, for the Conference of the Association of Musical Theatres at the Moscow State Academic Children's Musical Theatre named after Natalia Sats, who founded the theatre in 1965.

The theatre celebrated its 50th anniversary.

Natalia Sats pioneered the theatre for children in Russia and received numerous awards for her work, including the USSR State Prize, People's Artist of the USSR Award, Lenin Prize, Hero of Socialist Labor Medal and the Lenin Komsomol Prize



Manon also interviewed Natalia Sats' collaborator and husband at the Theatre, Viktor Petrovich Provorov, for the biography on Natalia Sats' life and work that she is currently working on.

Viktor Petrovich Provorov suffered a heart attack 2 weeks later and died on October 29. A memorial service was held at the Natalia Sats theatre on November 2nd.

Attached is a last picture of Provorov in the cabinet of Natalia Sats in front of her portrait, taken by Manon during the interview.

The 2016 WeeFestival of Theatre and Culture for Early Years
May 16 -23, 2016

The WeeFestival of Theatre and Culture for Early Years is a biennial festival organized by Theatre Direct Canada, a professional theatre for young audiences established in 1976.

The festival dedicated to very young audiences of children 0 -5 years is the first of its kind in Toronto and the second only in Canada after the Montreal Festival petits bonheurs, will feature 9 productions from leading creators of theatre and performance for early years from Europe, the UK and Canada.

In addition to performances taking place in four venues downtown Toronto, the festival will also host a symposium hosted by the Centre for Drama, Theatre, and Performance Studies at the University of Toronto as well as professional meetings and seminars, workshops, and roundtables to bring together artists, educators, producers, and presenters.

The full festival programme will be announced on December 7 with Delegate programme details released in early February.

The WeeFestival aims to:

- To promote and celebrate excellent theatre for children under the age of 6
- To inspire and support Canadian theatre artists creating for very young audiences
- To develop and strengthen touring cooperation and exchange related to theatre for early vears
- To advocate for the provision of quality arts experiences for very young children in their first 2000 days at home, in daycares, and kindergartens.

"Starke Stücke" is an international theatre festival aimed at young audiences, and in 2016 it is teaming up with the Mousonturm and the Theaterhaus Frankfurt to offer a multi-level international residency programme on the subject of Theatre for a Young Audience. International theatre producers and performers interested in working in this area, along with students at the Hessen Theatre Academy (HTA) and independent artists from the region are invited to the Starke Stücke Festival (1 - 11 March 2016).

During their stay at the Starke Stücke Festival, the residency group will discuss performances from the festival programme, meet international and local artists from the areas of theatre, dance and performance, as well as event organisers who work for young audiences, and will discuss their artistic practices, their research interests and their own project ideas in relation to a young audience. The participants will develop specific project plans, which they will develop in cooperation and/or in close exchange with one another in the subsequent project phases.

In July 2016 and February 2017 they will work on their own artistic projects as part of a residency, and these will then be shown in the 23rd edition of Starke Stücke in 2017.

ASSITEJ Hungary

Foreign Language Teaching Program Kabóca Puppet Theatre, Veszprém

Since 2009, the Kabóca Puppet Theatre of Veszprém, Hungary, has had an ongoing foreign language education program for children of all ages. English language stands as the focus of

the project, but in case there is growing need, we are open to including other languages, as well.

As the first element of our program, we introduced a project called Let's Play, which was a carefully planned educational program where puppetry was used in English language teaching. Our basic concept was that the performance of the actors, the puppets and the storyline can be understood without the in-depth knowledge of a foreign language - when the plot is not too complex, of course. We presented well-known situations on stage, like introductions, greetings, etc., where children could understand the actions well before the spoken words. Comprehension always comes first - and only then are we able to articulate and communicate foreign words and sentences. Still, there is another difficulty that we have to face: it is very common that we are afraid of being laughed at when not using these expressions correctly. Luckily, we realized that puppetry helps to motivate children, to grab their attention, to develop their sense of empathy, and their awakened need for selfexpression can be easily used to motivate them to communicate in a foreign language, to leave the "silent stage." In this project we worked together with several groups of children and their teachers for more than a year, and after each short puppet scene, there were postshow talks and language-focused lessons. The program was a great success but finally it came to an end. And while all participants were satisfied, we felt that somewhere on the way - or on the road - we used puppetry only for educational functions - so we had to find theatricality again.

So, after many years and much thought, we produced a new show, called *On the Road*, in February, 2014. The performance is presented in English, which is not the native language of any of the actors, but really it could be played in any language. The show reveals a situation familiar to everyone who has ever learned a foreign language or just traveled abroad: our characters are trying to get around at a train station.

Playwrights Intensive

ASSITEJ India, in collaboration with Bharatendu Natya Academy of Theatre Arts (BNA in short), organized a four-day Intensive workout on new scripts at the BNA campus in Lucknow, India. The idea was to help create a body of original scripts in the genre of TYA. Earlier, a call had been issued for submission of scripts, from out of which five plays had been selected by a panel of judges. The Intensive aimed at fine tuning the scripts written by

Deepika Arwing: One Dream Too Many

Kusum Punjabi: The Impotance of Being Ordinary

Sunil Bannur: I am Fine, Thank You Vinati Makhijani: The Other Side Indrani Barua: The Red Bicycle

The first three plays were targeted for young audience above 14 years. This by itself is important given the fact that plays for young adults are virtually non-existent in India.

The five plays were assigned to five groups comprising one playwright, one director, 5/6 student actors and one resource person from ASSITEJ India working as dramaturges. The engaging four-day process culminated in revising the plays, taking notes for further revisions, and in a presentation of rehearsed reading of select scenes before an invited audience.

The revised versions of the five plays will be submitted by the playwrights by end February,

2016 after which steps will be taken for production and publication.



ASSITEI Korea

Korean Children's Theatres in Paris January 12-23, 2016 at Théâtre de la Ville



The two theatre companies of ASSITEJ Korea, Art Stage SAN and THEBEFU, will hit the road next January to meet with French audiences at Théâtre de la Ville, one of the prestigious theatres venues in France. This project has been developed and organized under the framework of Korea-France Year 2015-2016 to celebrate 130 years of diplomatic relations with the support of Korea Arts Management Service and Institut Français.

"The Dallae's Story", Art Stage SAN

This performance evokes the everyday life of a family during the war. The efforts of each person to overcome suffering and deprivation, the importance of family spaces and the power of life... all this is seen through the eyes of a little girl. Beyond the singular story of Korea that underwent particular suffering during the war, the expressiveness of the performers, the music and the visual qualities of the ensemble gives the performance universal scope.

It was awarded Best Play at the 21st UNIMA Congress and World Puppetry Festival in 2012.



MARSHAK - 2015

One more new Russian children's festival has appeared

This November the Russian festivals' map increased with a new theatre forum for children and youth called MARSHAK Festival which took place on October 31 to November 8 in Voronezh. The festival's name is connected with Samuel Marshak, an outstanding Russian writer, translator (mostly English poetry), and author of



children's books, who was born and lived in Voronezh city. Right before the start of the festival the world's first monument to Samuel Marshak was opened near the house where he lived and worked.

There were three main sections in the festival program: theatre for children (productions of professional theatre companies), children's theatre (productions of amateur studios where children play), and workshops for children with famous theatre directors, actors and educational specialists' participation.

In total 25 theatre productions for children and youth were presented at the festival. Many of them are nominees and winners of the Russian national theatre awards Golden Mask and Harlequin. Also three companies from Armenia, Belarus and Kazakhstan were among the participants.

MARSHAK-2015 was a bright and truly grand event. All theatre venues of the city were involved- the Opera and Ballet Theatre, Drama Theatre, Chamber Theatre, TYA, Puppet Theatre "Shut", and Voronezh concert hall. About 18 thousand people attended the event, and this new festival has become one of the largest theatre forums in Russia, addressed to children.

ASSITEJ Serbia

Theater festivals for the end of the year

There is much to see, experience and hear over the last weeks in theatre for children and young people in Serbia. With the end of the year coming closer, it almost seems the theatre makers in Serbia are racing with time, hurrying to achieve everything that they have planned and not yet managed to fulfill for 2015. The small amount of funds, which our state allocates for culture, delays in its fundraising system and its practice to subsidize only one-year programs make any long-term planning of programs and festival impossible. The lack of finances, which is becoming more and more serious with the emerging global problems that we are facing, represents one of the main threats to TYA in Serbia. These factors have already led to two important theatre festivals for children and young in Serbia being put on hold: *International Theatre Belgrade Adventure TIBA* and the national festival *FESTIĆ*. Lets hope that this is only a temporary situation. On the other hand, this situation that we find ourselves in has already influenced significant shifts in the calendar of festival events. It so

happened that instead of having festivals proportionately distributed throughout the year, those festivals that were able to gain the finances and survive are now squeezed together in only a couple of weeks.

And so, on the same day in Belgrade, a regional festival of professional theatre for children <code>Dečji pozorišni festival Pozorište Zvezdarište</code> closed with the awards ceremony, and only one hour later a regional festival of socially engaged theater <code>OFF Frame festival</code> opened. The OFF Frame festival lasted until November 30, and only a day later, on December 1st the <code>46th Festival of Serbian Professional Puppet Theatres</code> began. This festival is held in a different city every year, and this year it will be hosted by the Puppet Theatre Niš. Although it is first and foremost a national festival gathering the members of UNIMA Serbia, it is also a valuable opportunity to host the puppeteers from around the region.

Greetings from Mermaid Theatre of Nova Scotia ASSITE| Canada

We send greetings from Mermaid Theatre of Nova Scotia on the occasion of ASSITEJ's 50th Anniversary. Established in 1972, Mermaid Theatre's unique adaptations of children's literature have delighted more than five and a half million young people in twenty countries on four continents. The company's international debut at the ASSITEJ CYMRU - Wales Festival of 1977 set the stage for Mermaid's subsequent successes, and the company's co-founder (Sara Lee



Lewis) served on the Executive Committee of ASSITEJ from 1979-1984 as well as participated in the V1 and V11 International Congresses in Madrid and Lyon.

During the 2015-2016 season Mermaid Theatre will present three separate productions in English, Mandarin, French, Spanish and Japanese throughout the United States and Canada, as well as return to Singapore, Japan, Ireland and China.

Closer to home, Mermaid maintains a strong local and regional presence through teaching, mentoring and presenting activities through its innovative Institute of Puppetry Arts instructional programs, and the Mermaid Youtheatre's vibrant outreach activities for adolescents.
