

Introduction

In my first meetings as an Executive Committee member, I recall having participated in discussions about the way in which ASSITEJ should promote the celebration of the World Day of Theatre for Children and Young People. Many thought that having a good message given by some artist of renown and spreading this message would suffice, and that it was not particularly necessary to promote any special activity in their countries.

In order to give more presence to ASSITEJ among Mexican artists, we decided to take it more seriously and not only to spread the message, but also to promote special activities for the occasion. I was initially sceptical myself regarding this festivity, but quickly realized after the first year of celebrating it, that it was a unique opportunity to attract attention towards TYA and to make it clear that this particular celebration made us an essential part of an international movement.

By being part of this international world activity, the multiple references and guidelines not only contribute to awareness and understanding of other's practices, but also to self-knowledge as well as acknowledgement. So each year as we celebrate this day, we can review where we are, what we have done, where we have moved towards, and what plans we have, as this applies to artistic, social, educational and even political arenas.

I can also remember, from these first EC meetings, the challenging discussions on quality and artistic excellence. Given the dissimilar conditions and cultural hegemonies, how do we evaluate? I am among those who think that true artists are few and can be counted on one hand, but I equally think that art and its practices enrich us all and makes everyone a more complete and complex human being.

The circumstances of each of the different countries that make up ASSITEJ are so diverse that the reasons each one can have to celebrate, are many. Some will organize a festivity, give away free theatre tickets to children and perhaps reward their best artists. Others will see the opportunity to scrutinize and identify their deficiencies, or plan, research and entreat support for their projects.

During more recent years, ASSITEJ has subscribed to the Declaration of the Rights of Children and has placed greater emphasis on their birthright to have access to culture and the aesthetic experience, through theatre. In 2016, ASSITEJ celebrates this World Day by subscribing to the Convention on the Rights of Disabled People.

Some may think that all of this is a distraction from actual artistic issues relevant to our association; that perhaps TYA in its worst expressions has been used for "good" causes.

Yet others may think, on the contrary, that disqualifications narrow the viewing angle and limit perception and interpretation to conventional codes; that the diverse languages that serve theatre will be enriched by other points of view, other forms, other sensitivities and perceptions.

Faced with challenges that are continuously brought forth by reality, I often times perceive a feeling of impotence that is shared by many other creators around the world. Yet once again, TYA appears as a possibility of impact and effect, of participation, reunion, and collaboration. A possibility of creation.

Jenny Sealey Artistic Director, Graeae Theatre Company, Co-director of the 2012 London Paralympics.

I simply cannot imagine a world without theatre or the arts. As a young Deaf girl, ballet classes became a safe place to be me. It was a visual world and one where I participated through watching and the relief of not having to lip read was liberating. I would get lost in the exercises and so loved the creating of ballet stories and performing. Ballet was my first experience of storytelling and as I got older I got involved in theatre and most importantly Young People's Theatre. What an extraordinary training ground for any actor and what an opportunity to share creative space with children and young people listening to the stories of their lives and making them into plays to give their experiences, trials and tribulations of life a platform to be heard.

At the time of writing I am directing *Stepping Stones* by Mike Kenny which I co-directed with Jon Palmer for Interplay 18 years ago. The production was as is the new one with Graeae's new Ensemble cast of all Deaf and disabled performers, aged between 20-22 year old) for young people with profound and multiple disabilities, for young Deaf and blind, disabled and non- disabled people. The joy of working thinking about creative access with sign language, audio description, sound and atmosphere is cemented in the belief that ALL young people should have full and equal access to theatre.

I get increasingly frustrated that the importance of creating work for and with and by young people is still not fully recognised and funded. It breaks my heart knowing that many disabled children are not deemed worthy of an education in many many countries, BUT my travels around the world are a reminder that the passion of those of you who drive this work means that we will not have a world without theatre and that theatre is an education to a life.

As 2016 marks the 10th year since the Convention on the Rights of Disabled People was adopted at the United Nations, it is a great opportunity to hold hands across the globe to continually fuel that passion and to work as a community to ensure we are able to make, create and share theatre that matters, by and for those who matter.

It is five years since we started the #Takeachildtothetheatretoday campaign, which is celebrated in many places around the globe on and around the *World Day of Theatre for Children and Young People*, 20th March. This campaign has offered ASSITEJ members a strong space for advocacy, and with the campaign has come many compelling reasons, contained in messages, speeches and articles, arguing for why children and young people should be exposed to theatre.

These reasons include: the rights of children as cultural citizens; the fact that theatre

educates holistically though fostering multiple intelligences; the importance of cultivating curiosity, imagination and joy in children; the need for children to have hope in an often confusing and desperate world; the importance of aesthetic awareness and a capacity to embrace the diverse languages of the arts; the need for community, connection and empathy; the present-now-ness of theatre and its capacity to allow us to confront and question the world as we experience it; the urgency of embracing a diversity of views...

But I wonder if there isn't another, more fundamental, reason why artists make work for young audiences, that goes beyond these stated intentions.

This reason may be far more deeply personal. In making work for children and young people, we are able to nurture, to heal and to strengthen the inner child in ourselves.

When a group of South African township-based youth started to work on a play for very young children, they discovered that making the work required that they nurture, rediscover, or in some cases, discover for the very first time...the innocence, the tenderness, the vulnerability, and potential wholeness within themselves. This began a profound healing process for these young artists which deeply affected them and which has motivated them to continue exploring in the field.

From this deep personal need, we then in turn are able to influence others. By nurturing ourselves into greater wholeness, we are able to enter into a more whole relationship with our audience. We are also able to offer parents and children, families, teachers, care-givers and their charges, opportunities to see the world through the eyes of the youngest amongst us.

So often I have heard some variation as I leave the theatre of a parent saying, "I couldn't believe that my child could sit still for so long", or "that my child found so much humour in that play"... in these moments of discovering who that child really is, theatre artists may in turn be contributing to greater wholeness in these fundamentally important relationships.

Perhaps the greatest gift that theatre for children and young people can give us – whether we are an artist, audience member, parent, teacher or child – is the gift of finding wholeness in brokenness, and rediscovering who we were always meant to be.



Theatre is wonderful because there is no right answer.

In Japan (or not only in Japan), children are placed in a very competitive society. Even though there are very few human abilities that can be evaluated by scores, most people misunderstand that scores are the only standard by which to evaluate a person; therefore, there are a number of children dropping out even when they have wonderful abilities.



In theatre, there is no right answer. In theatre, it is good if each one displays in a lively way what he or she is capable of. A person can find a character within him/herself and through the work of finding him/herself in a character, he or she can sympathize with others. Naturally such an experience is varied person by person. Ten people have ten different expressions and it is impossible to evaluate any of them with scores. So there is no score in theatre. No-one will go into ecstasies or get depressed. This is why theatre brings a person up in the best possible way.

I hope children come into contact with theatre to experience this wonderful moment - where they can find similarities to themselves in characters in a play, think 'what if' he or she were a character, and be thrilled. And when they have finished watching a play, a sense of sympathy has grown in each one of them.

To parents: please take your children to theatre, the only place where they grow in a lively way, even in this very competitive society, today.

To teachers: Please protect a school theatre program that Japan can be proud of in the world, and try to stop the reduction of its numbers.

And to you, children: please enjoy theatre, asking your parents to take you to theatre if you have a chance.

Today is the day that theatres for children in the world share this same idea. And the today starts from here in Japan. Let us be at the forefront of leading this idea through the rest of the world.



As an arts organization that is continuously evolving The Little Art has recently ventured into creating a new performing arts program for children in Pakistan. We envision to empower children and youth to create meaningful theatre for young people in Pakistan.

Workshops

Since our approach includes developing skills of people in this art form, we sought for support from CKU- Center of Culture and Development Denmark and with their assistance this year we are launching Tamasha, through which we envision to create exciting opportunities for children's theater in Pakistan.

He will be missed, and many of us will be comforted to know that, wherever he is, he is still creating joy and mischief in his own delightful pirate-king way.

International Director's Seminar for TYA 25 Seminars in 40 Years

Almost 500 directors from 74 countries and all continents have taken part in ASSITEJ Germany's International Directors' Seminar for TYA since its invention in 1976.

Reflections.

Between 1976 and 1990 the seminar took place annually with few exceptions. It was organized by the ASSITEJ Center in the GDR and invited directors from Eastern Europe as well as from so-called capitalist countries to join a more theoretical discourse. Since 1993 the seminar takes place every other year in different places in re-united Germany. It has taken on the characteristics of a more practical workshop where about 30 directors, two thirds from abroad and one third from theaters in Germany, share six days of intense work and exchange. Smaller groups work on a text, a scene a short drama or an illustrated book and they use their time to share their approaches to directing. Ten individuals who are used to making decisions are in one room, speak English without being native speakers and organize their work for the week. It speaks for itself that this situation creates interesting group dynamics.

Lively discussions about the different social and political situations everyone deals with in their home countries add to the program of theatre shows (often a first encounter with the German theatre landscape) and exploring the hosting city. These weeks create an atmosphere where it is natural that people from different countries that might be rivals in everyday politics, i.e. Iran and Israel, meet and talk in peace.

The selection of the seminar's topics is based on the idea of universal questions that are of interest to directors from all over the world. The seminars of the past few years have covered a broad array of topic areas from "Death and Farewell" to "Fairy Tales," "Family" and "Migration" to "Heimat (Home)" and "Progress."
