Introduction

Being part of ASSITEJ has opened up a world of approaches to theatre and the meaning it has for a young audience.

Recently I witnessed a theatre room of very small children intent on the same moment before them – a wordless performance involving time passing, melancholy and ducks. The children were together in the experience but also completely individual in their response. There in front of me was a human being's ability to let go of self and engage with the universe. It was visible proof of the magic that occurs through an audience's imagination to transform reality.

There is a great ASSITEJ campaign called Take a Child to the Theatre which reminds us that children do not go to the theatre of their own volition; they have to be taken and this only happens if the adults around them think that it's important. In a child's life, adults choose for them and decide for them in matters ranging from the most trivial to the most life threatening. The powerlessness of children is a fact that affects their cultural citizenship.

When a person experiences theatre they are within a live event that involves the senses, the emotions and the imagination as well as a kind of contract of belief. For a time our own reaction and opinion matters most and it is a private experience as well as a shared one. It is a reminder of the power of our own thoughts and of the central, strong place within every individual that remains their own. The artist's intention is one thing, what the audience receives is another.

The nature of theatre; subjective, nuanced, intangible - is one of the things that enables human beings to realise their individual power of expression and belief. The private world of experience is the strength within us all no matter our knowledge or expertise...my thoughts are my own

In many parts of the world, including my own country, adults are invested in control. Driven by anxiety about safety and fear of the world we live in, we deny our children physical freedoms we once had and we are inclined to fill every waking moment with interpretation and commentary.

Through theatre we have the chance to offer space and time to subjective experience and offer a place where the child's power and sense of control is returned.

The theatrical transaction at its best draws this out no matter the age and to enable participation in theatre at any age, whatever the economic situation, whatever the ability, is a goal worth aiming for.

Our challenge as theatre makers is to have no need to adjust the realities or expectations of our audience but to provide the pathways for them to have the most powerful time of their lives.

The World Congress is the most important meeting of all members of ASSITEJ, taking place once every three years. It is the culmination of the working life of the association for that three-year period, reflecting on the last period of activity and creating a vision collectively with members for the future.

The Performing Arts festival will encompass a diverse and rich range of theatre productions from across the globe during the last few years, with a special focus on Africa as the "Cradle of Creativity" and on inter-cultural collaborations. It will give a snapshot of theatre for young audiences as it exists at this point in history, and as represented by performances from a wide variety of countries and continents. This is the first time that the Congress and Festival will be held on African soil.

The Festival comprises several platforms, including the International, African and Collaborative Platforms.

ON THE EDGE Symposium Programme

The ASSITEJ Artistic Gathering (AAG) offers an annual opportunity for the international membership of ASSITEJ, artists and other stakeholders to gather in one place to explore TYA Practice – it was created to afford the possibility to explore practice; to challenge and learn from colleagues and peers, and to be inspired through exposure and networking within the field of TYA.

Details of the extensive ON THE EDGE Symposium have recently been announced. Delegates can look forward to a week packed with workshops, lectures, papers, panel discussions and more, to accompany the busy performance programme.

The theme for the ON THE EDGE Symposium is: Where are the Pioneers: Who is on the edge of practice & research?

In putting together the Symposium Programme the organisers wanted to explore what being on the edge might mean to theatre practitioners today. For some, it might be around challenging cultural boundaries, by breeching norms in choice of subject matter, or by taking work across and between different cultural contexts. For others, an edge is a meeting point where practices join, from one practice discipline to another or where ways of thinking join ways of making. For still others, the edge might be a marginal social position that theatre practices try to redress; or, it might be an institutional margin overcome by pulling organizations into networks.

Highlights of the ON THE EDGE Symposium include:

- The ASSITEJ Artistic Encounters on 7-9 July, which explore three themes: Interdisciplinary Practice, Freedom of Speech and Artistic Identity.
- Workshops by a host of specialist TYA practitioners including the Royal Shakespeare Company, N.I.E. Theatre, Upfront Performance Network.
- Case-studies from the cutting edge of TYA practice e.g. Higher Education: *Current Training Practices Internationally*, Theatre from the Inside: *Immersive Theatre Practices*.
- There will be a full and interactive programme from the ASSITEJ Networks (ITYARN, WLPG, IIAN, Small Size and Next Generation).
- A unique event to connect with international partners through Creative Europe: *Across the Borders* which will include networking opportunities

Freedom Prison focuses on freedom and restriction – in terms of politics, art, humanity and history. Sustainability and diversity is

The first ASSITEJ Prize

ASSITEJ Finland gave out the first ASSITEJ prize to a well known puppeteer and founder of Puppet Theatre Sampo, **Maija Barič** in Finland. The prize was given because of Maijas's lifelong achievements with Finnish children's theatre. Since the 1970s Maija has been a magnificent pioneer of theatre and arts education in Finland publishing dozens of books related to puppetry as well as performing and writing plays herself. She founded Puppet Theatre Sampo together with her husband and retired from the post of artistic director in 2014

The prize was given on 20th March as a part of ASSITEJ World Day of Theatre for Children in 2016.

Acting Up! and Teatriukas in Vilnius

During the month of March, Acting Up! and Teatriukas in Vilnius, Lithuania presented a regular series of early year story and song sessions called Vintage Voices.

Essentially an introduction to the theatre experience, this month saw Dalia Mikoliunate adding Lithuanian traditional songs to the programme. Vintage Voices is designed to create an intimate atmosphere of communication in an artistic environment which both baby and adult will enjoy.

We are developing an audience that will increase its expectations with regard to early year theatre as they become more familiar with the experience. We are also researching why they come and what words they associate with their experience at the theatre afterwards. Teatriukas translates as Little Theatre and the space is ideal for very young children to experience the theatre for the first time.

Despite its size, the theatre has a costume department, props area, lighting box, as well as kitchen and bathroom facilities. Teatriukas was one of the first independent theatre companies formed in Lithuania after 1991 and directors Dalia and Zilvinas pride themselves on their ability to embrace new audiences, new projects and new partnerships in an international context.

Acting Up! director Cliodhna Noonan says "Teatriukas was a real gem to find and being able to perform there has changed my whole impression of this posting to Vilnius!!!" In May 2016, the second edition of the Labas! Early Years Festival will be hosted by this very active partnership of Acting Up! and Teatriukas.

Non Aligned Dramas for Children and Adolescents. D.N.A.

Torino, Kids and Youngsters Casa Teatro, October 16 and 17 2015. Two intense days, bursting with all the energy developed and matured over two years of work. Two days of cross-fertilization between

generations of artists who, starting in November 2013, decided to put their heads together and create a workshop focusing on drama specifically aimed at children and adolescents. A workshop encouraging participants to think - but above all to explore a method on which much of kids' theatre is based.

A workshop with few rules but centred around three principles: choose a public, get to know a public and – as a result of this relationship – generate original and specific theatre. Three principles which Unoteatro's artistic directors (Silvano Antonelli, Dino Arru, and Guido Castiglia) have always considered an essential element, the true building blocks of the project, able to launch a robust identity process for Kids Theatre: the D.N.A. of Unoteatro, as in many other Italian theatre companies.

Amid a flurry of official appointments, scheduled stages and an entire series of informal meetings, it is almost impossible to tell the story of D.N.A. – to do so risks nullifying the energy and intensity that were such a feature of the entire project. So many images that remain in one's head: the first community moment with "theatre calling cards;" the presentation of principles by the three artistic directors in front of an audience of curious youngsters; the acceptance of the game; the first rehearsals.

And then again, the presentation of the first theatre studios; interaction with the Estate Bambini public in Ferrara, and with youngsters participating in the Legàmi project in Cascina; the presentation of the evolution of nine theatre studios in November 2013; bringing it all to a close, on 16 and 17 October 2015, with two vibrant days in Torino.



An intense process of interaction and a burning desire to relaunch; a moment that saw, before an audience composed of youngsters, operators, journalists and politicians, the presentation of three theatrical performances together with the presentation of the DNA Charter, a document generated by this entire movement of dramaturgical exploration and analysis.
