Getting ready to be "On the Edge"...

When our colleagues from the UK and Ireland invented "On the Edge" as a motto for the ASSITEJ Artistic Gathering in Birmingham, their idea was to create openness, initiate experiments, inspire new approaches and question the things we may feel quite sure about. In just a few weeks' time, we'll have the opportunity to experience a programme full of ideas that are presented on stages and podiums, in talks and workshops and we are looking forward to it.

At the same time millions of people all over the world are fleeing from war and hunger, right wing politics have – again – become popular all over Europe, anonymous capitalism seems to reign in economics ..., and "On the Edge" may have become much more than just a festival motto stimulating artistic exchange across borders. Today, people in Europe feel much closer to the edges of the world they used to know and they experience that Eurocentrism needs to be questioned in many ways.

Theater artists in Germany and elsewhere are asked to take a position. At the same time people, audience and artists alike, may have a feeling of not knowing where to start, what is important, what is secondary and how can we work together to create a world where human rights and democracy, tolerance and respect are possible, where wealth is shared and freedom of speech valued and defended? Let us share ideas! Let us talk about serious issues in the inspiring atmosphere of our "encounters"!

This is not the time for simple answers. It is a time full of complicated discussions about complex issues and the arts and artists cannot withdraw themselves. It is in the arts and in theatre where utopia can flourish, where complexity can become inspiration, where perspectives can be changed, where new world orders can be staged and tested. It is our task to encourage and enable people to ask questions, work together and to dare to give new answers. Being "On the Edge" is an opportunity, but also a responsibility. In TYA we can learn from each other and we can learn from others who have been "On the Edge" before, who have found new ways not only to create theatre, but also to create society. Worldwide.

Secondary students from Shenley Academy and Small Heath Schools in Birmingham are coming together to create their own piece of drama inspired by the themes of tolerance and extremism found in **Pim & Theo**.

South Korean company **Brush** are spending time with Year 5 pupils at the Robin Hood Academy to make a curtain-raiser performance at ON THE EDGE, and Peter's Hill Primary School are working with the **Seydou Boro Theatre Company** to explore the ideas found in **Why do hyenas have shorter back legs than front legs and why do monkeys have bare bottoms?** Monkeyshine Theatre are also spending time in Birmingham schools, whilst Theatre Lovett are taking part in online hangouts with a class of pupils before hosting a special meet-and-greet for them on the set of their show during the Festival.

Pupils and teachers at Mayfield Special School are enjoying private performances of **Bliss**, a sensory performance made especially for children and young people with profound and multiple learning disabilities.

A group of young people from all corners of the UK and Ireland are being trained as theatre reviewers ahead of ON THE EDGE, and will present an award to their favourite show at the end of the Festival.

ASSITEJ Azerbaijan will take part in four international theater festivals this year



The first festival will be in Trabzon city of Turkey on 2-15th of May.

The next festival will be held on May 21-29, in the Lobnya, Moscow region. We would like to point out that the main purpose of the festival, which has been conducted since 1995, is to enhance the interest of a young audience to rich heritage of classical Russian literature, music and choreography, including the Russian theater art, and use new theater methods in the way of children's upbringing and development.

The third festival which is called "Seating Yard" will be held from May 27 until June 2. A number of theater groups from different countries will participate during the festival which will be held on the eve of the 160 year anniversary of the Orenburg State Drama Theatre named after M. Gorky. The main mission of the festival is to restore and strengthen cooperation in international and regional theaters.

The fourth and last festival will be held in the UK. The invitation was given by UMUD LTD Company.

Suzanne Lebeau 2016 GGPAA for Lifetime Artistic Achievement - Theatre





Suzanne Lebeau, playwright and co-artistic director of Le Carrousel, compagnie de théâtre, is the recipient of the GGPAA for Lifetime Artistic Achievement – Theatre, the highest distinction awarded in the performing arts in Canada. The names of the 2016 recipients were revealed this morning (April 14th) by the Governor General's Performing Arts Awards Foundation during an event held at Centre Phi in Montréal. Alongside Ms. Lebeau, four other artists received Lifetime Artistic Achievement

Awards in their respective disciplines: Susan Aglukark (Popular Music), Marie Chouinard (Dance), Ben Heppner (Classical Music), Robert Lantos (Film).

Each year, the Governor General's Performing Arts Awards recognize a group of artists and arts volunteers for their outstanding lifetime contribution to Canada's cultural life. The 2016 recipients will be honoured at various events taking place in Ottawa in June, culminating with the Governor General's Performing Arts Awards Gala presented at the National Arts Centre on Saturda.

The First Theatre only for children

Jongno Children's Theatre (hereinafter called the Theatre) is the first municipal theatre designed only for children, which is located near Daehak-ro, the theatre district, in Seoul. The theatre features a natural and convenient environment for children with a large lobby and 250 child-sized seats in the venue. The Theatre opened on April 30th.

Mayor of Jongno District nominated Dr. KIM Sookhee, President of ASSITEJ Korea, as Artistic Director of the Theatre to manage the venue and programs with good quality for children. As an opening performance "A Story about Rainbow Island" was presented, which was awarded Playwright Prize in Korea in January, 2016. From the opening performance, KiwooPiwoo Puppetry Festival and the 24th ASSITEJ Korea International Summer Festival will be continued at the Theatre until the end of July.

We believe that the Theatre will function like the New Victory Theatre (New York), Polka Theatre and Unicorn Theatre (London) in Korea by presenting quality pieces all throughout the year.

A Bridge that Crosses Borders THT's Binational Audience School





To go and see theater in another city may not be "the plan" every Sunday; now, imagine going to see theater in another country. The odds are fewer. However, in the Mexico-United States border of Tijuana-San Diego, a new project has begun that makes this a possibility; even, a reality. This border, known for being one of the most visited in the world, shares territory, economy, customs and now, THEATER.

Tijuana Hace Teatro (THT *Tijuana Does Theatre*) is a Company that integrates programs where new audiences come closer to theater; one of them is *THT's Audience School*, in which a group of 20 people go to the theater for free during a year, and see approximately 50 shows: musicals, drama plays and dance shows targeted to young and older audiences, produced by local, national and international performing arts companies.

Since 2014, after participating in the annual Theatre Communications Group conference in San Diego, five theater companies became a part of Audience School; adding a bi-national phase to the project. This has allowed people and creators from both sides of the border, to get to know the theater that is being made in their neighbor city, better and up closer.



Inter-disciplinary Arts for Babies and Young Children

One of the challenges of creating inter-disciplinary work for young audiences is a) how to foreground the language and instrument of the body in a way that is accessible and understandable for the baby and/or young audience, b) finding ways of incorporating that instrument without isolating the young audience member's reception of the work. Another challenge is how to create a cohesive product that fuses sound, materials and the physical landscape in a way that will engage the child without overwhelming or overstimulating them. In other words, for example, how do you baby-whisper at just the right volume and tempo, and with the suitable materials to keep the baby seated and focused for twenty to forty minutes.

These are the kind of questions that were asked repeatedly during the creation process for the following works: *Ekhaya*, aimed at 3-7 year olds, *KNOCKI*, aimed at 3-7 year olds and *SCOOP: Kitchen Play for Moms and Babes*, aimed at 2 week-12 month old babies and their carers.

In 2015 Magnet Theatre, based in Cape Town, South Africa, sought to create new original works for children under seven. The year's repertoire included of *Ekhaya*, and *SCOOP: Kitchen Play for Moms and Babes*. Each production underwent a two-week incubation process facilitated by international children's theatre experts, who were sourced through ASSITEJ SA. This was followed by a four-week creation process, and the productions then went on to tour for four weeks. The first two productions: *Ekhaya*, toured for two weeks in Cape Town and two weeks outside of Cape Town, more specifically Clanwilliam *(Ekhaya)*. *SCOOP*, being the first production made for babies under twelve months in South Africa, only toured locally for four weeks, so as to first establish solid relationships with nearby children's institutions.

Ekhaya, incubated under mentorship from Gabi Dan Droste, explores the notions of home and how children understand their relationship with home. It delves into their understanding of what it means to be at home in various contexts. It utilises appropriate language, song, and imagery constructed by the body and waste boxes. *Ekhaya* crafts a whimsical world, where water bubbles appear from boxes and chalk makes the invisible visible though simple drawing. The narrative follows a child who is without a box, which is symbolic for a home, and desires nothing more than to own one. In the end through the help of her friends and through a series of discoveries, her wish is granted. We then follow her relationship with this box (home) and the various activities that take place in and around it. The audience witnesses the protagonist sleeping in her home, doing chores in her home and having friends over in her home. At the end the audience is invited to draw their home. The production is performed in three languages: Isixhosa, Afrikaans and English, to accommodate the range of audiences that it aims to reach.
