Artists Meet Early Years

Opportunity

Festival Visioni Di Futuro, Visioni Di Teatro 2017 24 February - 5 March, 2017. Bologna, Italy

CALL

The Artists Meet Early Years Programme offers to the artists the chance to meet early years right in the places where children belong to an educational community, crèches and kindergartens, in order to observe them, to become more familiar with them, and to collect suggestions and images that can be useful to the development of a personal artistic research on the youngest ones.

Thanks to Artists Meet Early Years, 6 young artists (under 35 years old) will have the opportunity to visit some educational services belonging to IES (an institution for schools and education of the Municipality of Bologna) dedicated to children 0-3 or 3-6 years old for two consecutive days.

Two days in a row in the same school, where the selected artists will be free to present fragments of a performance, tell a story or lead a workshop, either in a kindergarten or in a crèche.

By meeting the children again in their educational environment the very next day, the artists can live with them a new kind of experience.

Coming back means to be able to understand in a better way the reality of the educational services visited, as well as to build up a direct relationship with children and educators.

Visioni is a festival of theatre and culture dedicated to early years. It is one of the Small Size Festivals – the European Network for the Diffusion of Performing Arts for Early Years – where artists and performers from all around the world gather and share their experience.

The artists selected will have the chance to take part in the events of the festival (such as shows, conferences, workshops, meetings...), and also to exchange their experiences with other artists and to work with the target group of early year's children. "Visioni di futuro, Visioni di teatro..." will take place at Testoni Ragazzi Theatre in Bologna (Italy) from February 24th to March 5th 2017.

Artists Meet Early Years will take place from February 27th to March 3rd 2017.

This call is open to 6 artists, also to last year's participants, to whom we will offer accommodation and subsistence for 3 days and facilitations for the festival activities.

Latin American Network of Performing Arts for the Early Years

Gladly we share the creation of the Latin American Network of Creators of Theater for Early Years. This network is an initiative born in Mexico, and is formed of three companies from different states of the republic: Teatro en Espiral Collective, Baja California; A la Deriva Teatro, Jalisco; Teatro al Vacío, Mexico City. The artists who integrate these companies share the interest of working for legitimizing the right of children to art and culture.

The Network seeks to create and disseminate scenic quality proposals responsibly and to commit to the public, with respect and sensitivity. It also seeks to generate research that shows the current situation of the performing arts for children of early years, to keep open the possibility of dialogue with other networks, participate in meetings, festivals and symposia. In July this year, A la Deriva Teatro produced the First International Festival of Theatre for Early Years FITPA, in the city of Guadalajara, Mexico.

It is essential to offer children experiences that besides providing a pleasant space, also opens to them the opportunity to participate with other children and adults in community building.

It is necessary to commit ourselves as creators to conceive creative spaces of individual and collective subjectivity; start producing concrete actions that impact society and all children are seen, heard, that they can actively participate in society and exercise their rights to art and culture.

ASSITEJ China China Children's Drama Festival 7th July - 25th August 2017. Beijing, China



Approved by the Ministry of Culture and hosted by China National Theatre for Children, China Children's Theatre Festival has successfully held six sessions since 2011. On the theme of "Light Children's Heart and Shape the

Future", the festival is trying to show various kinds of culture and art from different countries, helping Chinese audience to learn more about the world. It aims to promote the development of world drama for children and to strengthen international exchanges and cooperation.

So far, China Children's Theatre Festival has already invited 130 art groups from more than 20 countries and regions including The United States, Canada, England, Spain, Germany, Finland, Sweden, Czech, Japan, Korea, Turkey, Romania, Argentina, Lithuania, etc. During the six years, more than 253 drama productions have made nearly 1,235 performances for more than 900,000 audiences. Through excellent international drama performances, communications, different drama seminars and various drama activities, China Children's Theatre Festival has become an important window to display domestic and foreign drama achievements; provided a great platform to promote the developments and communications, as well as a new bridge to gather strength and support.

CNTC's Cultural Exchange with Missoula Children's Theatre



From September 30th to October 11th, Ms. Feng Li, Vice President of China National Theatre for Children (CNTC), leading a group of 15 members to visit Montana, U.S.A., had a cultural exchange with Missoula Children's Theatre. Ten kids, aged from 10 to 12, experienced American culture and performed *The Princess and the Pea* in English with 48 Missoula kids from Missoula Children's Theatre (MCT).

On October 8th and 9th, almost 60 kids

from China and the U.S. performed *The Princess and the Pea* for 3 shows on the stage. The performances were a complete success. Local audiences loved the Chinese kids' performance. After the last show, many American kids were shedding tears since the Chinese kids would leave the U.S. the next day. During the last few days, they became good friends with each other.

This is the first time that CNTC took kids abroad using foreign language. It is also a new step for Chinese theatre, and a meaningful interactivity between China and the U.S. This program was listed in the 7th Round China-US High Level Consultation on People-to-People Exchange in 2016. This is the third year for CNTC to collaborate with MCT. The two theatres will keep their great relationship and explore more opportunities for cooperation in the future. We believe CNTC will also expand international cooperation and looking forward more cultural exchange.

The 19th Meeting of The Professional Theaters for Children and Youth of The Croatian ASSITEI Center

HRVATSKI CENTAR ASSITEJ

The Croatian ASSITEJ Center this year will celebrate 20 years since its establishment in 1996 and the activities of the center, as well as its members, all painted in these celebratory colors.

The Croatian ASSITEJ Center consists of 25 professional theaters for children and youth. These include public institutions, municipal theaters, cultural centers, private theaters, and artistic organizations. Additionally, our members include 10 individuals, artists who regularly work in theaters for children and youth.

Every year, and now for the 19th time, the HC ASSITEJ has organized national meetings of professional theaters for children and young people, for the 16th time in Čakovec, where the best Croatian theater, artists, critics, and guests from the region and the world gather to share knowledge and experiences in theaters for children and youth.

As the program is extensive, and the annual production is large, for the last few years a selector chooses the top 10 of the performances from last year at the festival. This year the selector was the theater director Drazen Ferenčina. The performances were evaluated by a professional jury composed of Jasminka Mesarić, theater producer, Jasmin Novljaković, theater director, and Morana Dolenc, theater director, actress, and puppeteer.

Scenes d'enfance - ASSITEJ France "Shaping stories - Construire des histoires", a laboratory for TYA playwriting in French - speaking Africa

It is in the frame of the African Festival of Theatre for Children and Youth (Fatej), which will celebrate its 20th anniversary from November 11 to 18, 2016, that the first session of "Shaping stories - Construire une histoire" will take place; a Laboratory in French-speaking contemporary playwriting for young people, designed by Scènes d'enfance - ASSITEJ France as part of the Regional workshops of ASSITEJ International.

Starting from an acknowledgment of the weak representation of French-speaking Africa in the applications for the Festival "The Cradle of Creativity", which will host ASSITEJ's Congress in May 2017, we developed the project of training sessions and exchanges, led by high level speakers, and proposed to artists interested in young audiences, and living in Africa. The theme, drama, or "How to build a story", will allow the gathering of professionals from different disciplines. The program of the session in Yaounde, designed collectively by Karin Serres (author), Gustave Akakpo (author, associated artist with the Tarmac, French international theatre for francophone) and Pascale Grillandini (Postures Association) includes several events: round table, dramaturgical and playwriting workshops, feedback and reflection on consistency.

ASSITEJ Hungary Here Flies the Hummingbird! News from Kolibri Theater



Founded in 1992 by Executive and Artistic Director, composer and theatre director János Novák, Kolibri Theatre for Children and Youth is the only professional children's and youth theatre in Hungary which has its own company and performs for children from 0 up to



18 years of age.

It has three performance venues: the big auditorium in Kolibri Theatre hosts comprehensive artwork productions for 6 to 12-year-olds, featuring actors, puppets, live music and varied stage techniques. The two smaller venues have a seating capacity of 50 each. Kolibri Fészek (Nest) is a theatre room for the youngest audiences staging early year performances and tales often combined

with interactive games, while Kolibri Pince (Cellar) hosts productions for young adults. Related to the performances, the theater also offers reading sessions and theatre-ineducation programs. Kolibri has a vast and varied repertoire of 33 performances per season: in the season 2016-2017 this includes 3 plays for babies, 19 for children and 11 for young adults. Within the framework of Platform Shift+ and Small Size - Performing Arts for Early Years Kolibri Theatre will create international co-productions as well.

On 3 September 2016 Kolibri Theatre launched the season with its regular open-air family event, the **Kolibri Season Opening Festival.** 8 productions from all around the country and beyond the borders of Hungary were invited to the festival. In memory of the legendary puppeteer and founder of the festival Henrik Kemény, puppet performances – including the host theatre's performance *Kippkopp and Tipptopp* by Veronika Marék – offered the audiences full-day entertainment.

ASSITEJ Korea Exciting Art Explorations for all!



ASSITEJ Korea is having very busy weeks ahead of our annual winter festival which will be held between 4th and 14th of January 2017. <Exciting Art Explorations> Project is one of the biggest cultural welfare programmes organized by *Art Council Korea* caring for culturally marginalized people and military camps, isolated rural areas, as well as a few remediation centers are some of the previous beneficiaries.

ASSITEJ Korea organized 12 performances for 12 Inno Cities and each performance is carefully designed to give opportunities for young audiences and their family members to join some cultural experience combined with the performance. This opportunity allows great joy and happiness not only for immigrant newcomers, but also for native residents. It is true to one-time dwellers of the metropolitan with their relatively affluent cultural experience to remember their familiar memories, but it is also true to the people who actually have some expectation and hope for the new era after the influx of populations and capital. Therefore this kind of cultural experience did play an integrative role for both sides, naturally. The project will be continued until the end of December.

Since 2007, Korean government planned to create several "Inno Cities," by dispatching more than 175 state-run corporations and research institutes from Seoul to provinces across the country by 2012.

In different laboratories the participants examined section specific networks, debated partnerships under changed politico-cultural conditions and designed visions for the ASSITEJ to be taken seriously as a strong association.

We look back happily and contentedly on the two stimulating and intense days.

We are all Theatrically Interwoven

Dora Theatre Company and company ma's tour in Serbia and Croatia

It was an epoch-making event in many ways.

<u>ASSITEJ Serbia</u> in collaboration with <u>ASSITEJ Croatia</u> invited a Japanese TYA production named "Ayanasu (Woven)", which <u>Dora</u>, a 45-year-old modern-drama company, experimentally created in collaboration with a newborn company called "<u>company ma</u>", whose work was not

yet known, after the East Japan Great Earthquake for the company's 40th anniversary.



ASSITEJ Serbia has established a strongly trustworthy relationship with TYA in Japan for the last few years, bringing and creating baby drama called "Baby Space" by Dalija Acin Thelander and having a number of lectures by Diana Krzanic Tepavac, who is the initiator of all these establishments, in Japan.

Due to Diana's commitment,

ASSITEJ Serbia achieved to make this tour happen with supports from Japan Foundation in Serbia and Tokyo Arts Council in a magical collaboration with the Japanese theatre companies through a wonderful coordinator, Jovana Savic from <u>Bosko Buha Theatre</u> in Belgrade, who later became our tour manager.

As most of those who have done international collaboration work probably know, it is not easy to coordinate a tour. Especially with this tour, where we have traveled 3 cities in Serbia and 3 cities in Croatia (from small ones to big ones), performed in 6 different theatres (once again from small ones to big ones with different availabilities of technical equipment and so on) and gave workshops in 4 theatres. ASSITEJ Serbia and Croatia must have coped so well for this cultural event through the tremendous coordinating work of Jovana.

International Research project of TiE and DiE effect measurement R.U.IN?

Drama methods' innovation for inclusive youth communities

Nyitott Kör Egyesület (Open Circle Association) from Hungary is coordinating a strategic partnership amongst four drama and education organizations: TheatrEtc from Cyprus, Sigma Art from Romania and CEDEUM from Serbia. The project has been funded by the Erasmus+KA2 and is on-going for 20 months from September 2016.

In our quickly changing and globalizing world often focusing on individual assertiveness we forget about the importance of functional communities and tolerant environments where one can feel safe and supported. One of the most important socializing spaces we participate in (after the given family context) is the school community, the classroom. Another important environment for the age group of 6-18 years olds are the



communities they participate in according to their free time activities, hobbies, and extracurricular occupations. Educators, teachers and youth workers leading classes and groups experience the phenomena of bullying among the students. The long-term effects of bullying are numerous, and can include sensitivity, anxiety, and depression. Recent statistics suggest that the majority of students will experience bullying at some point in their academic

careers. In the early 21st century, increasing attention has been given to the importance of teachers, group leaders, educators and parents understanding and recognizing the signs of bullying (amongst both bullies and victims), and being equipped with strategies and tools to address school bullying and deal with it as a community, in or out of the classroom. Drama and theatre in education has proven (DICE research, 2009) that it can effectively improve Lisbon Key competences. The project partners believe that it can also deal with aggressive behaviors, power inequity and victimization distress. We would like to prove that through a research and based on that, improve our methodology in a collaborative process, in which we explore what elements could be implemented most successfully for the reason to decrease bullying in a certain community.

Schoolyard Stories 2nd. Edition. Adolescent Identity

Since 2008, when the Schoolyard Stories (Patios del Recreo) - Theatre for Adolescents- 1st. Edition was launched, ATINA (ASSITEJ Argentina) has been interested in organizing different proposals that could encourage the development of a qualified theatre devoted to young people.

In Argentina, as well as in the rest of Ibero America, we have a large theatre production for children (3 to 8 years old, approximately) but very few proposals devoted to adolescents and teenagers.



When children are 10 years old, they stop going to the theatre with their family or with their teachers. What happens? Are they no longer interested? Do they get bored? None of these reasons are reliable. The truth is simpler: they do not find suitable proposals that can be enjoyable, which allow identification, where theatre talks to them about themes that they are really interested in. Youngsters think that the productions are children or for adults. Productions coming from TV series are an exception, of course.

To be able to change this situation, and in this way to include young people as a possible audience, artists need to go on working, to run risks and to try once and again to present new and updated proposals.

Schoolyard Stories is a project that can promote this change, encourage artists to create for adolescents and encourage adolescents to go to the theatre.

This proposal is created in Europe in 1999, because of the need of finding new themes and new styles for an audience target particularly reluctant to attend theatre (young people from 13 to 18 years old), in a moment when there were very few theatre productions devoted to them

Schoolyard Stories 1st.
