ASSITEJ SA has been working with 20 schools in 4 districts over the last two years. These schools are rural, and under-resourced. They work under challenging circumstances and have little in the way of resources to deal with the demands of the curriculum.

The ASSITEJ SA "Kickstarter Creative Arts" project has uplifted the schools with training in the arts subject "Creative Arts". We've engaged with them around suggestions of recycled materials and by providing the schools with Art resources and instruments.

# **Dance for Young Audiences - Aha moments and cushion squeezing**by Nicola Elliott

It seems weird to me now, but only a few years ago I thought of 'children's theatre' as inferior to the pursuits of, uh ... 'normal' theatre.

It's not that I thought children were unintelligent, or that the artists who made the work weren't talented or hardworking. I suspect I thought that the needs of this audience – their incomplete education, their famously short attention spans, the sense that they had only two settings, indifferent or over-excited – would dominate the work to the extent that concept, form, intention and craft would have to tow the line slavishly or be obliterated entirely.

In this, therefore, I was basically an ignoramus; but I wasn't in a vacuum. At drama school, our 'Family Theatre' module consisted of one weekly practical for half a semester. We saw it as preparation for our rent money, one step up from waitering. Certainly, we didn't see it as a vocation, not as a vehicle for the best of our ideas, hard work and creativity. And so, of course, the work we produced was crass and generalized. Bored, we did it and moved on fast.

By 2014, I knew my assumptions were way off. ASSITEJ SA was gaining traction and TYA as a constellation of distinct, sophisticated genres was beeping on any working radar everywhere. But dance for young audiences? I understood the hooks that narrative performance could send out, but what of performance without overt narrative? I sat down one day with a stack of DVDs and began.

Well, the aha moments came thick and fast; and pretty soon I was hooked. A year or so later, two performers and I were packing a trailer and heading out to crèches with our very own dance show for 0-4 year olds.

So what would I tell my younger student self? Could I say that every audience member loved it? That they threw roses at our feet and begged for encores? No, no I couldn't say that. The facts are that some were transformed, some were entertained, and some simply squeezed their little cushion for 40 minutes, stared into space, rocked gently in time to the music and occasionally glanced at the dancers. Nothing is for everyone, and you, Younger Self, would do well to write that down. The real point is that creating a vehicle for transformation, entertainment or quality cushion-squeezing time, takes every ounce of its fair share and more of our talents, ideas,

creativity, love and hard work. A transaction I regret not one bit.
